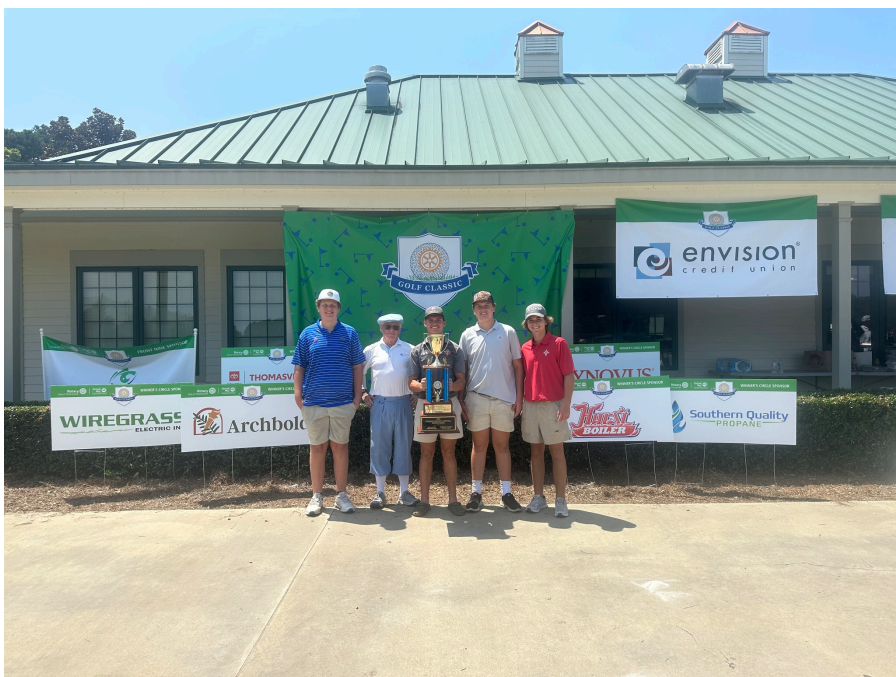

Each household received a variety of fresh and frozen foods, including collards, zucchini, sweet potatoes, blueberries, peaches, oranges, strawberries, and chicken.



On the Thursday preceding the market, more than fifty-five Rotarians and friends met at Second Harvest to pack and sort vegetables and fruits for Saturday's market. After working, the group had a delicious lunch of fajitas provided by Anne Candelaria's restaurant and homemade cookies for dessert.

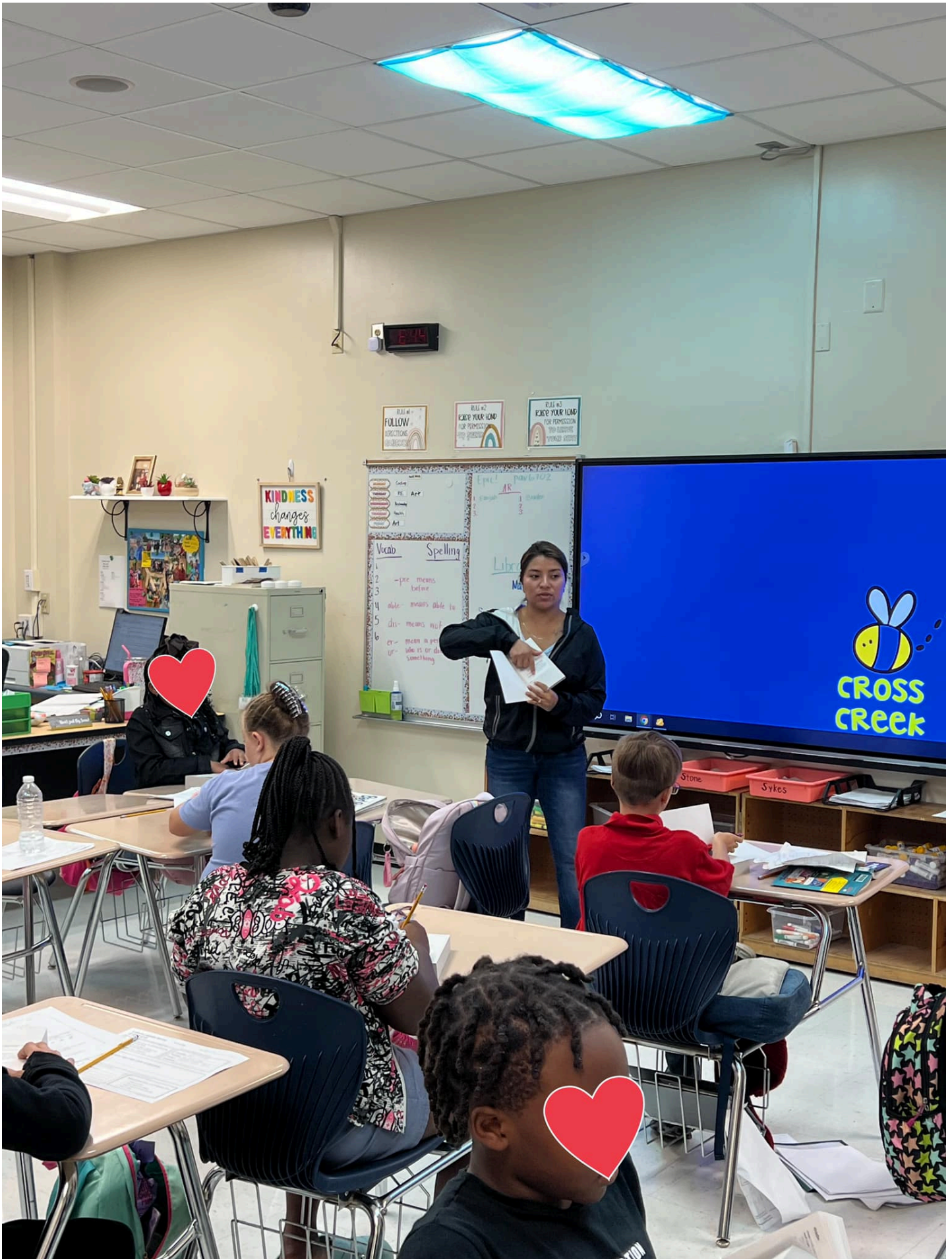

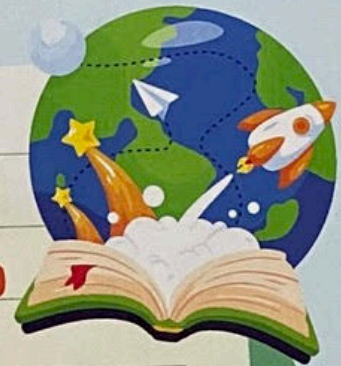
R.E.A.D. Initiative

What began with just four scholars has now grown into a network of over 3,692 alumni from around the world. The program's profound impact on fostering global perspectives is evident in the diverse range of backgrounds and experiences represented by its participants.

Amin Hollander will be pursuing his higher education at Thomas University, marking a significant step forward for both him and the university.
